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What to do when your child doesn't want to do work!

Allowing choice

Allow your child a feeling of control by letting them decide the order of the tasks or when the task will start.

e.g. do you want to have your bath first and then do reading or reading then bath?

e.g. present the 3 or 4 work tasks they need to complete throughout the day, work together to fit them into their daily timetable e.g. present the 3 or 4 tasks that need to be completed and allow them to pick which one to do, when they finish that let them choose the next one and so on.

Tips – Ensure the tasks aren't too difficult. These choices can be supported with visuals

Changing the task

Is the task too easy/hard?

- Contact the teacher to see if they can send something else
- Use real world items to support learning, e.g. counters/coins for maths, photos/YouTube videos to support topic work

Is the task too long/short?

- Cut/fold the worksheet in half or into pieces
- Have breaks while working, insert movement activities into a longer task e.g. supermovers on the BBC

Is your child struggling to complete the task?

- If your child has difficulties with fine motor skills and the task needs things cut out, can you help by cutting them out? Can they dictate their work for you to write out?
- Write the beginning of the sentence to get them started with their writing
- If writing a story, work together and draw out the scenes/make notes so the child can use these to refer to when writing
- Allow your child to record work in other ways, on the computer, audio/video record them.

Is the task meaningful/relevant?

- If the work is not interesting to the child use a reward system to get them to complete it. E.g. now and next board or token working for charts
- Use their special interests to motivate them e.g. an addition task – can they use their favourite toys to count? E.g. story writing - can they incorporate their favourite topics e.g. space, buses, animals into their story

Is the task easy to understand?

- Use additional visuals and real world objects/pictures to support understanding
Highlight/underline keywords in the question
- Complete a few questions together before leaving them to work independently
- If stuck ask the school for help by email or telephone.

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
