Vocabulary

pyre: Wooden structure used to burn a body and create ashes that can then be sprinkled in a river

dharma: One's religious duty for a Hindu person

Karma: The results of your actions for a Hindu person

Ganga: The river Ganga is considered sacred and is personified as a goddess Ganga. It is worshipped by Hindu people who believe that bathing in the river gets rid of sins and facilitates Moksha (liberation from the cycle of life and death) the water of Ganga is considered very pure

Atman: Hindu term for the soul of a person

Resurrection: The act of bringing something that had disappeared or ended back into use or existence, for Christians this is what made Jesus not just a prophet but proof that he was God's son – his resurrection

Reincarnation: Hindu and Sikh people believe that a soul goes through many lives, hopefully improving and becoming more perfect. When you reach perfection you then become one with god through Moksha

Rebirth: Buddhists believe we are made up of a life force and that life force (think of it as the atoms and molecules within you) will continue to live after your life in a new form in the world

Paradise: What Muslim's call Heaven

Heaven: What Christians call life after death

Moksha: The term used in Hinduism for the release of the

soul from the body
