Vocabulary

Shahadah: The Shahadah is the first of the Five Pillars of Islam. It is a declaration of Muslim beliefs and states, "There is no God but Allah, and Muhammad is his messenger."

Bishmillah: 'Al-Rahman al Raheem' Arabic for 'In the name of Allah, the compassionate and merciful' which begins each sentence in the Qur'an

The Hadith: The Hadiths (there are a number of them, which were written by Muhammad's daughter) which contain the teaching and sayings of Muhammad that explain the teachings of the Qur'an. Some are to referred to by all Muslim people, and others less so.

The Qur'an: The Quran is the central religious text of Islam, which Muslims believe to be a revelation from God

Sunni Muslim: The largest group of Muslim people within the religion followed by 87–90% of the world's Muslims. This group followed after Muhammad's death Abu Bakr, a companion of Muhammad

Shia Muslim: A group of Muslim people within the religion followed by 13-10% of the world's Muslims. This group followed after Muhammad's death Abu Bakr, Muhammad's grandson 'Ali'
