
Polar Regions - Frozen Worlds

WHAT IS A CONTINENT?

A continent is a massive area of land that is separated from other areas of land by water or natural features. Five of the continents are connected to at least one other continent by land, whilst **Antarctica** and **Australia** (Oceana) are cut off by oceans. Each continent has a wide range of land types, climates and animal life.

The Polar Regions consist of the Arctic and Antarctic.
They are located at the very top and very bottom of the
Earth. There are lots of similarities and differences.





The Antarctic - Penguins, seals, orcas, albatrosses



The Arctic - Polar bears, walruses, whales and narwhals.



Animals have to adapt to ensure they stay warm. For example: having a thick layer of fat or feathers; burrowing into the ground to stay warm and hibernating during the coldest months.

Where are the Polar Lands?

The polar regions are two snowy places at the top and the bottom of the earth. They are called the Arctic (North Pole) and Antarctica (South Pole). The hottest part of the Earth is called the Equator and this is in the middle.



How do People Travel?

As the land is covered in snow and ice for much of the year, some people use sledges pulled by husky dogs to travel around. However, snowmobiles are being used more nowadays as they can be faster.






Polar bears and penguins do not live in the same pole.

Do people live in the Polar Regions?

Approximately four million people call this wintery wonderland home. Amongst these are the indigenous people of the Arctic, called the 'intuits.' They've found many ways to survive in one of the harshest environments on our planet.



Antarctica is the only continent with no permanent human habitation. There are, however, permanent human settlements where scientists and support staff live for part of the year.



Animals in the Polar Regions

There are lots of animals in the polar regions and they have very thick fur so they don't get cold. Many of them have a layer of blubber underneath their fur to keep them warm too. Some of the animals are white in colour so that they are camouflaged against the snow.
