

5 words to remember

data: information that is collected for analysis, often, but not always, in the form of numbers

export: to save media in a format so that it can be watched, listened to or read by others, without needing access to the editing software used during creation

filter (database): a button used to identify a subset of data that meets certain criteria

personal information: information that reveals someone's identity

survey: questions asked to a group of people to learn more about their opinions or experiences

Good **survey** design is important to make sure questions are clear and the **data** collected is accurate and useful.

Key takeaways

- ❑ Surveys are a good way of finding out what people think about a topic, for example an ice-cream company may use a survey to find out what people think about some ideas for new flavours.
- ❑ Survey questions can be listed on paper, but it is far more efficient to design surveys using software such as Google Forms.
- ❑ Surveys allow for different types of questions. These may include:
 - **Short-answer text:** the question requires a short open answer
 - **Paragraphs:** the question requires a longer open answer
 - **Multiple choice:** only one option can be chosen
 - **Checkboxes:** multiple options can be chosen
 - **Dropdown:** one option can be chosen (this is similar to multiple choice)
 - **Linear scale:** asks for an opinion on a numerical scale
 - **Multiple-choice grids:** several questions can be answered using the same options, but limited to one choice per row
 - **Checkbox grid:** several questions can be answered using the same option, and multiple options can be chosen
- ❑ Questions should never ask for any identifying **personal information**.
- ❑ Once data has been collected, responses can be viewed in Google Forms or **exported** (transferred) to Google Sheets.

Google Sheets: Filtering and charts

When data is exported to Google Sheets, the **filter** button can be used to find specific information. This is very useful if you have a lot of responses.

The 'insert chart' feature creates graphs of selected data, which presents the data in a simple way that can help understanding.
